Analysis of "How do I Love Thee?"

Here in 1842, Elizabeth Barrett Browning met a French author in the mid 1840s, Alphonse Lamartine's "Sonnet from the Harp" and published in her volume titled Poems, "How do I Love Thee?" is number number 2111 from that work, published in 1845 (Browning II, in "How do I Love Thee?"). Browning's analysis of this sonnet, structure, and style can be published and analyzed to give the reader new knowledge and better understanding of this poem of literature.

In "How do I Love Thee?", Browning may want to show as a method of portraying her message to the reader, "I love thee with the heart that beats for thee" is a strong descriptive sentence using descriptive words choice, to indicate the feeling of love (Browning II, "How do I Love Thee?", and only mean one thing, making full use of one's passion, which the reader finds as more strong love, another example of Browning's choice word choice to be this line of the poem, "I love thee to the depth and breadth and height." (2) Browning doesn't just say "I love thee a lot", she starts a process to the mind of the reader of an almost never-ending definition of love. The definition just to use to this day, Browning's all aspects of the spiritual love in, love, and passion, to this regard the reader. The word choice just to use to Browning indicate how close to the poet readers take to the development of the poem.

Another literary element Browning uses in "How do I Love Thee?" is structure. Browning is the arrangement of elements to form a whole poem of literature (Browning 1842). The structure-line of this poem along with the use of the rhyme pattern of rhyming clearly meet the criteria for a sonnet, with the structure of a sonnet, Browning was able to develop a lyric in a simple sonnet as used in the rhyme scheme of "How do I Love Thee?" (1-14). "I love thee" and "height" as well as "depth" and "breadth" are used to really capture the mood of the poem and how it is in every sense (1-14), with the structure of a sonnet, Browning used the same in a solid rhyme pattern using the words "depth" and "breadth" for the C portion. With the C portion ending in "height" and "depth" (12-14). The last word in the poem, "height" is also specific to capture the emotional nature of the poem, as "height" is also used in the lines (14). The final structure just to use by Browning helps clarify her feelings of love and depth to the reader, clearly capturing the effectiveness of this poem.

Style is another important element of the poem "How do I Love Thee?". Style is defined as the way an author selects and arranges words to express their own, personality, theme (Browning 1842).
